DEMO: Brian Nobel-Marx and the "Kayak" Bowl Form

Brian found this idea in a UK woodturning magazine. He uses 8/4 wood and a Fibonacci series (1,1,2,3,5,8...) for the dimensions because they are pleasing to the eye. He believes the more axes you turn on the more the piece moves from function to art. The small ones take him about 4-6 hours to complete and he turns 2 at a time (Two 8/4 pieces of wood with craft paper stuck between them).



Brian turns a cylinder first then makes little "V" cuts to mark the center (pencil marks get turned away). He turns the curvature on one side out from the center and the other side is a mirror image; he measures to make sure so it's balanced. Brian likes the football shape and turns the tips to 3/4 thickness at the edge. He sands #150 on the lathe and the final 2 grits are sanded with the grain and off the lathe.

Time to separate the 2 pieces and mark the centers. Draw a line from "V" to "V". Drill a hole for a screw chuck. Turn a flat spot on the bottom.

Now it's time to glue it to a faceplate (hole up). Put tape around the "kayak" and hot glue the mounting blocks to the tape. Mark the center of the face plate (tape the hole) and place a under a steady plumb bob. Place the "kayak" hole under the plumb bob on top of the faceplate. Hot glue the blocks to the face plate. Use lots of hot glue around the edges. Cut the


Chesterfield county fair had 6 peoples working for 8 days. That's a lot of turning!


