The "Very Big" and the "Very Small": Can you tell who has the bigger lathe? Not for long :)! What is that little thing anyway? This three sided partial sphere thing was Tom Crabb inspired. It was called a practice piece (translated not up to standard yet). We were reminded by Barry Irby that everything we do is a practice piece. Are we ever truly happy with our work? Seems there is almost always something else we wish we had done. Never being satisfied is what leads us to higher achievement.

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June Demonstrator George Kraynak showed us a small portion of his talent producing spindles for the chair shown below. The picture doesn't do it the justice it deserves. George pays close attention to detail. He has studied the creation, design and development of this vintage style and made his own improvements in many areas. George is a dedicated and talented craftsman in many ways.

The spindle was turned from White Oak. A small section was turned in the center to provide an area for the steady rest to ride. This has to be done slowly due to the vibration.



After mounting the steady rest the spindle was cut to size in several locations and the segments between turned to meet. George provided several tips along the way. THANKS George!

Irene Grafert (shown below) demonstrated coloring and texturing at our last special all day event. The tips she passed along will save us all countless hours of research, trial and most of all ERROR. Like many other artist she stressed the need to properly prepare your work prior to finishing.

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4H Project Aide

The 4H project is shaping up with many bowls and tops delivered to date. We are sure this will be a big hit with the kids.

The exercise is fun and rewarding at the same time. Since no two tops have to be alike it gives you time to practice many different type of cuts with a variety of your favorite tools (and the not so favorite (SKEW)).

Following is an example of how to produce the tops. There are many ways to approach the production. This method was relatively easy to setup and provided for quick change between pieces. I am sure each of you has your own method of which many would be faster and better than this.
