Demo for month: Jim's Off-Center Platter

Start with a block of wood banded sawed rough round and 1 3 4 inch thick (have to cut 2



chuck feet). To reduce the dust and lube the cutting, Jim soaks the dry wood in soapy water for 1+ days (6:1, water:soap). Turn the bottom, turn the top edge and put a bead on it. Turn the first recess on the bottom for reverse chucking. Make it just deep enough to hold on to your chuck (1/8 to 3/16 deeper is not better). Reverse the wood. Flatten the top. Use a scrapper to get it smooth. Cut some parallel grooves. Jim used a 3 pointed scrapper to do the deed. [Continued on page 2]

A **rose engine lathe** is a specialized kind of ornamental <u>lathe</u>. The head-stock rocks back and forth with a rocking motion or along the spindle axis in a pumping motion, controlled by a cam-like pattern mounted on the spindle. Rose engine work can make flower patterns, as well as convoluted, symmetrical, multi-lobed organic patterns. The patterns it produces are similar to that of a <u>Spirograph</u>. No other ornamental lathe can produce these "rose" patterns. (Wikipedia). AAW Demo will show you how to build & use one

[Jim from page 1] Drill a new screw chuck hole about 1 inch from the center hole. Remount the wood. Start slow (350 + rpm). Watch your hand position; you start off cutting lots of air. A lamp on the turning shows the shadows better. Cut to the rim and round up to the new center. Cut a new large recess as before to support the off center turning. Cut away the old recess. The more times your rotate the turning, the thicker the wood needs to be. Reverse chuck the platter to turn the bowl part. If the chuck jaws are far enough open, you can fit your calipers into it to measure the thickness of the bowl bottom. Sand to 400 grit and finish with Walnut oil or Waterlox. An article in AAW Summer 2007 by Keith Gotschall shows these steps. He will be in VA Beach in November 2008 (relatives) so maybe we can get him here for a demo. (K2turner@salidaco.com)
