Demo of the Month

Dug Campbell (Son of Skew): Spindle Duplication Quickie

Do you have an old porch with broken balusters? Want to fix it up before sale? Then Dug is your man or read on and save yourself a bundle. First you need a pattern. Remove a good spindle, strip off the paint and cut it in half. If you have a lots to make a storyboard will speed up the process. Make it shorter than the spindle and mark all the major details; Cut in notches with a triangle file. Mount the wood and mark the pummel ends. Rough out the center with a "fluted skew" (Barbara D got you Dug) and mark it while it's turning. A long tool rest is a great time saver here. The rest is all real skew work. Dug uses calipers as he has seen lots of flying dividers in his day. A well made design he says will repeat the diameters. Dug also says no one can see all the balusters at once so don't fight with the fine details and besides they will get painted. Spring is

Things I Learned from Don Geiger's Demo

<u>Grinding wheels</u> are not balanced or round when you buy them and could have faults in them. Tap around a new wheel in 8 places on both sides; the ring should sound the same or it has a dead place (return it). Center & balance the good wheel with a Geiger magic tool (~\$80 at AAW Symposium, not a dresser). Put everything you need from sharpening to turning supplies on a <u>wheeled cart</u> and keep it close. You might spend more time turning and resharpen your tools more often. Drift and spalted woods dull tools faster because of the embedded minerals they contain. Most turnings

are done with a 60° grind on the tools. Keeping your hands together, grind one side, then the other, and blend at the nose. Don't spend much time at the nose and don't over grind (Oops, my tools are really short already).

<u>Green wood blanks</u> from free wood are the greatest. Cut the logs into long lengths and paint the ends ASAP. When you have time, waste the ends, cross-cut into lengths equal to the diameter of the log, cut into 2 semi-circles through the pith and seal with paraffin.

<u>4-Jaw Chucks.</u> Never let the tenon rest on the base of the chuck. Size the tenon so the jaws are almost closed when they are tightens.

When <u>mounting the blank</u> mark the pith and center. Drill a 3/16 inch hole in the bark side. With a circle guide draw a circle and band saw it round. Redrill the hole with ~2 inch Forstner bit, just into the cambium layer. Mount between centers. Use the tool rest to find the end wings. Shift the apex (up /down) on the tail stock on the pith line. Lock it down and turn at low speed / high torque. Rough it out to semi round then adjust the head stock so the valleys are equal (right / left). Finish turning almost round. Remount on a face plate with square drive #14 wood screws. Counter sink the holes on the wood side (screwing puffs up wood grain).

Finishing cuts need a burr. As a burr will only last ~1 inch, resharpen frequently.

When doing <u>demos</u>, bring everything you will need including a lathe, vacuum pump, heavy duty dolly, backup tools, and a trailer to carry it all. BETSY
