## Demo: Hollow Form, What is it?

Can be an open or closed form, dry or green wood, pith or no pith, reaction or no reaction wood. It's all your choice, but first you need to bandsaw a blank and drill through the bark into solid wood for mounting between centers. Keep the tool at the centerline (bark at the headstock) and round up



the blank. Then mark out the shoulder, top diameter and the bottom, cut a dovetail tenon. Rechuck it by the tenon (best grip is just before closing tight) and reshape it round.



Keep the bulk of wood at the headstock. Make a smooth curve and check it with a small scale. Danny used a skew to score the bark first before shaping the edge (cut wood in the winter to keep the bark tighter). Finish shaping the outside. Power sand to #600 grit. Wet wood clods up the sandpaper fast so have a file card handy to clean it out.





Forstner bit, slow down the speed and clear out the chips often. Work from the top down into the form (you can't go back as the wall will be too thin and might warp. Use all your hollowing tools (straight, angle, swan neck, arm holders, laser, etc). Cut at center line or just above to leave an escape path for possible catches. Clean up the inside with light strokes using a scraper. Jam chuck it to finish the bottom. Concave it a bit, cut off and sand. **[Continued on page 2]**





scraper used with the Sorby swan neck tool he used, it is also supplied with a 3/16" tool steel cutter , which is much less aggressive than the tear drop scraper, and should be used for roughing. The tear drop scraper is used for light, finishing cuts.





Also, for measuring wall thickness around the neck area, bend two identical wires in a "U" shape, with one leg long and one leg short as

shown in the photo demo and hold them perpendicular to the wall being measured. When the long legs of

both wires are held parallel, the gap between points is the same at both ends.
