

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DEMO: Introduction to Segmented Turning with

Brad Bradford

What a great demo to have so little actual turning time. The immortal Ray Allen (father of Segmented Turning" said something like "You can't demonstrate segmented turning because it takes to much time". Brad came with handouts, a flipchart and several glued up stages of a salad bowl and did a good job on an impossible task. Take note all you later demonstrators, he has set the bar higher and made my life easier.

The big question is "Why cut up a nice board into little pieces?" Brad explained it as minimum waste from turning out a center, less wood weight to wrestle on to the lathe, use dry wood and no warping (exploding, yes), only 2 foot lengths of wood to store, can use exotic woods in smaller quantities, make patterns in wood and the grain all going the same direction.

Persistence is the game here. All the designing, cutting segments, sanding, gluing segments into rings, sanding, gluing rings into a bowl, turning, sanding and finishing takes patience & persistence. There are ways to speed up the cutting: making a cut list, taping wood together to cut 2 every time, and making big rings to part off smaller rings from it or bandsaw them in half (2 rings).

Brad uses a cut off saw with lots of teeth (and jig) to cut the segments. He said you can use a table saw, but add a cross-cut table top with zero clearance. You need a disk sander & jig for better fits. Fit all the segments together for 1 ring, hole it up to the light: gaps-sand some more; no gaps-glue up 2 segments at a time (no clamps), then 4

segments (should be a 90 degree angle for a 12 segment ring, make a jigto check it). Some day if you're fast, you can glue up 12 segments (6 and 6 with a spacer between them) at once and put a hose clamp around it. Use a hammer to flatten the segments before drying. **[Continued on page2]**

[Brad from page 1] After drying separate them, check the gap, sand if necessary, then glue the two (6-segement halves) together. Sand the 2 sides ends flat, then glue together to form a complete ring.

Attach a solid base to a face plate and sand flat with a sanding board (#80 grit). Cover the lathe, glue on the ring, center it, add some pressure, let it dry (30 min), flatten the front edge and do it again. Brad only uses a scraper on the inside of the bowls. Turn it to final inside diameter, sand then use a bowl gouge on the outside. As Brad and others have said "If you do it (segmented turning) fast, you're doing it wrong".

After your first segmented turning is finished, you'll want & need

more things so your next bowl has tighter joints, better wood, matched grain, etc. This is just a teaser write-up. If you can't demo segmented turning then I sure can't write it up in 250 words. (See Brad's handouts and flipchart pages on the website).

Jimmy Clewes' Demo
