

David Sterling and Turning Greenwood Goblet

Close grain greenwood like dogwood, maple or fruitwood work best for this demo. Turn them thin and let them dry naturally, warping makes it more interesting. Start with a diameter branch of 2.5 to 3 inches and about 8-9 inch long.

Avoiding the pith by $\sim 1/4$ inch (weak wood), mount the branch between centers, mark the top and bottom (leave 2+ inches for a chuck mount latter); the rest will be the stem.

Clean up the base for the chuck tenon, square up the ends, turn a tenon, define the bottom of the bowl and the top of the base; remount the base tenon in the 4-jaw chuck and move up the tail stock.

David uses a ¼ inch bowl gouge with a steep bevel to hollow out the cup. Leave the center in as long as possible, then cut out the center cone and save the tail spur (David threw his out into the woods, not good form). Sand the inside, wet/dry paper works well because the wood is wet. Abranet is good too. Keep a top light handy to gage the wall thickness and see surface scratches and dry out the wood. Work down the sanding grits.

How thin a stem? How brave are you? Pad the cup's inside (a Nerf ball works for me) and bring up the tail drive. Turn the outside of the cup and form it's base. Aim for a uniform thin, thickness. The light will help you gage the thickness. Sand the outside of the cup and move on to the stem. Turn the stem and the top of the base, sand both now as the flexing of the thin parts will made it difficult later. **[Continued on page 2]**





[Demo from page 1] Define the bottom of the base (Did you leave enough room for this?). Undercut the base to the thickness of the cup. Light pressure only the stem can't take much. Good luck turning.

Things: Platter, bowl, lidded vessel, pepper mill, Mason jar, bark vessel, natural edge bowl, big vessel, pen, dust collector adapter, segmented vessel, chair.

Wood: Walnut, mango, cedar burr, crabapple, plum, mango, holly, spalted maple, cherry burr, acrylic, poplar,

JOHN JORDAN is a woodturner from TN. Known primarily for

his textured and carved hollow vessels, John has been featured in nearly every major turning exhibition the past twenty-five years. His work has received numerous awards, can be found in many corporate and private collections, and is in the permanent collections of over twenty-five museums, including the Renwick Gallery of the Smithsonian in Washington, DC, the Hunter Museum of Art in Chattanooga, the White House in Washington, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Mint Museum of Craft + Design in Charlotte, the prestigious Victoria & Albert Museum in London and more. John is in great demand as a demonstrator/teacher,

traveling extensively teaching at universities, craft schools, turning groups and trade shows throughout the US, Canada, the UK, Europe, Asia and Australia, including an annual week or two at Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts and Anderson Ranch, CO. His work, along with articles he has written, is frequently seen in publications in several countries, and can be found in numerous books on woodturning and craft. He has also produced three instructional woodturning videos,



which are very popular. John's pieces are initially turned on the lathe, from fresh, green logs, using a number of techniques and tools that have evolved over the years. Each piece is then hand carved and textured, using a variety of different hand and small powered tools. This texturing process is very labor intensive, and can take as much as several days to weeks to complete. There is little room for error during this carving- one small slip can ruin the piece. A light lacquer finish is applied to most pieces, including the dyed work. Coming in Oct to Woodcraft
