Penturners News January 2020

The featured demo this month was how to make oblique calligraphy pens. While there are many styles of calligraphy pens, most of the serious professional writers use this oblique style. Unlike a conventional pen, the nib sits at an angle to the main axis of the pen allowing for the ultimate flexibility to vary the line width of the lettering from thick to thin. It is this variation that makes much of calligraphy visually appealing.



Stan VanDruff showed us how to make several styles of nib holders, customizing each for the variety of nib sizes and types available and preparing the pen body to accept the nib holders.

February 20: Art Liestman: Thermoforming and other creative turning techniques, via remote

Quarterly Challenges

4th: Musical Instruments - Or item to create tones... not necessarily correct crisp tones, (CB recommended)


