What is the best and worst wood to turn?

Several years ago several experienced turners in our club held a panel discussion on the woods they like to turn and the the woods they did not and the reasons for both. As you would imagine they did not all agree on the perfect wood. In the same vein, they also did not agree on the woods they most disliked to turn. It was a very interesting and educational discussion. Fortunately, the event was recorded and if you would like to see it either for the first time or the tenth time here it is. This was done during the time we were not meeting in person, so it is presented in sections. Click the link for each of the panelist.

Ray Deyo started the panel with a discussion about properties and characteristics of wood and how knowing them helps him be a better turner.

Barbara Dill talks about her history with wood, turning, and of course, her favorites.

Ron Bishop tells of his love affair with black cherry.

<u>Iim Bumpas</u> tells us his favorite wood is free wood, then goes on to show some magnificent examples. Along the way, he mentions things he goes searching for, and those that he shies away from.

Dan Luttrell talks about some of his favorite woods, but also dives into the piercing he is known for.

Steve Schwartz wraps up the discussion with one of his favorites, Ash. He also says that you need to determine what you want to make before you can decide what kind of wood you want to use. And he talks about the importance of embellishment to him.

Woodcraft Guidelines for our Meetings

Woodcraft graciously provides a space for the club to meet. The store closes at 7:00 PM and they have an employee stay until our meeting ends. They have requested that we:

- 1- Do not wander around the store after they close. Do all your purchases prior to the 7:00 PM closing time.
- 2- Stay in the meeting area until the meeting is over and we are ready to leave. If you do have to leave prior to the end of the meeting, please arrange that with the Woodcraft representative ahead of time.
- 3- That we all leave at the same time, taking all visiting outside the store, so the representative can lock up and leave.

A neighbor with a variety of topless glass canisters asked if I could make tight fitting cork lids for them all. Not having even thought of turning cork before, it was time to find out. Resin impregnated cork was not an option for this project. As suspected, cork does not turn well at all, resulting with considerable tear. The down and dusty method was to rough turn oversize, then sand on the lathe to final size. Sanding to a smooth surface is very quick and very dusty. Dust collection and mask is a must. Turning cork is not recommended but can be done if needed for such a project.
