

#### Barbara Dill

I had the privilege of being invited to Barbara's shop to prepare this "Feature" article. The shop is strategically placed in the trees behind her house with a pond just to the right as you approach the shop. It is in a very tranquil and picturesque setting. Barbara was interesting to talk to one



on one, and was very generous with her time.

In the late 1980's, Barbara was working as a nurse at VCU and found the work to be very unfulfilling and draining. After work one day, she opened up a magazine and saw a picture of a carved piece of wood. That sparked a fire that has led her into several areas of working with wood starting with a wood carving class offered by Henrico County where she made several carved pieces. She retired from her nursing career in 1989 and was looking for something to keep her busy. She attended some craft shows and was introduced to wood turning. In 1990, 91, and 92, she attended week long classes at Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts in Gatlinburg, TN. After the first year, she purchased her first lathe and was on the way to a life long passion of working with wood. She began as most of us do, turning bowls primarily. She was one of five founding members of what is now Richmond



Woodturners. Then in 2006 she started doing some work with multi-axis turning. While she was fascinated with it, she was also frustrated because there were no systematic directions available to explained any of the processes involved which caused her to ask the question "what do I do next"? As she spent more and more time

with multi-axis turning, she began to visualize patterns that could be repeated and explained. In 2018, she wrote a book, Multi-Axis Spindle Turning: A Systematic Exploration. Her book provided outcome and results so that a piece could be planned, turned and reproduced. In addition, she has been published several times in the American Woodturner magazine and has made several videos that can be seen at her YouTube channel. Barbara has traveled far and wide to teach and share her love of multi-axis turning. Last year, she did a demonstration in Ireland. She also offered classes at her shop to turners who had a desire to learn her methodology of multi-axis turning. It can be argued that Barbara is the foremost authority on the subject.




Klingspor and Penn State discount programs

### **Tip**

Use ear buds with your iPhone to take photos remotely. This works especially well if you are using a tripod and you don't want to disturb your phone (camera). It's also handy when you're taking a photo in an awkward position and you can't get to the button on the screen. Plug your ear buds into the lightning port, open the camera app, and use the plus (+) button on the ear buds to snap photos. The plus button will also start and stop video recording.

These are the first things I've turned from a very damaged sycamore tree I had to cut down on the back of my property. I have several bowl blanks and more pepper grinder bodies that I still have to get to, but these three really show how seriously spalted the tree was. Sycamore isn't that hard a wood, but I've found little 'punk' or seriously weak parts in what I was able to harvest. I'll try getting a pic of the bowl blanks to you soon.

#### Steve Kellner







White Oak Lamp.: 14"diameter x 22" tall. I'm calling this my Mushroom lamp. Base is hollowed out and has 4 feet. It was turned from a log from my neighbor's tree and was only had a few minor checks to deal with. Hollowing the base was challenging because I had to finish shaping the outside which did not leave much to support the heavy base. I made a jam chuck and hollowed between centers to the extent I could and then added a steady rest to hollow the neck. The shade is not as thin or of uniform thickness as I would have liked because it was out of round. Before I knew it and could not re-turn the outside to compensate. I might have to remake at some point! After turning, the feet were carved (with the help of my router table), both pieces were grit blasted for texturing, were fumed with 30% ammonia (maybe a little too long) and were finished with Rock Hard Tabletop varnish.



Finial turned with skew only. Sycamore. 6.5" x .75". Doctors friction polish finish. Proportions aren't right, but could be worse! Sanded with 220 to remove some of my catches but since it's in one piece, they weren't too bad. Will keep practicing!



Cherry bowl, 9"x3.5". Twice turned and finished with walnut oil and buffing.

Maple burl,10" wide and 7" tall. Finished with Danish oil and then buffed. Decided to let the bark inclusion be an accent.

I wanted to do the 300 year old elm tree justice so I created this footed vessel wrapped in elm leaves. It was carved using rotary carvers and textured using John Jordan's rotary wire brush method. The finish is wipe on poly.


