Walnut bowl saved from the burn pile!



This bowl came within seconds of being tossed into the burn pile. As I was getting close to the final shape, a segment flew out of one side leaving a large gap (ranging from 0" to ½" wide and 2-1/2" long) and a small crack all the way across the bottom and up the opposite side. My first thought was to "toss it". After some additional consideration, I decided to attempt to salvage it. What did I have to lose except some time and some small amount of materials. The gain, on the other hand, would be the experience and education I would obtain (even if my attempt failed), and most of all, a walnut bowl. I first applied some thin CA glue over the crack on the inside and outside of the bowl. Next, I covered the gap on the outside of the bowl with Tyvek tape. I poured coffee grounds into the gap and then covered it with a thin layer of CA glue. This process was repeated until the gap was completely filled. My thinking was that the repair would look more natural if it mirrored the gap on the opposite side of the bowl, so I used a coping saw to cut out a gap to similar size and shape as the original gap. Using that same procedure, I repaired the new opening. Since the bowl shaping was almost complete, I knew that I was going to get a lot of vibration as I attempted to use a scraper to get to the final shape. I used my gloved hand to apply pressure on the opposite side of the bowl where pressure was also being applied with the scraper on the inside of the bowl. That process worked relatively well and I have used it several other times.

While I was pleased with the repair, the final finish left something to be desired. As it turns out, this may still be one of my favorite bowls, flaws and all.



Australian Mallee burl: 5"dia. x 2.5"tall, no finish. Burl from A. Bradford. Barbara Dill's Facebook post motivated me to turn something from it!



Hollow-forms with finials: design aesthetics; golden mean and extending hollow-form shape to finial 2.5" dia. x 12.5 tall, 5" finial. White oak burl hollow-form with 3/8" opening. Finial and base sycamore; no finish; 3.5" d x 10" t, 6" finial. Only finial is new.



Spalted maple bowl: 10.5"dia. x 5.5"tall, Renaissence wax finish. A little tricky to turn due to punkey

Cherry vessel 4 ½" by 5 ½" inches. Finished with Yorkshire grit and Minwax.

Red Oak with gold epoxy, 8" x 2.5" finished with Odies Oil.
