She is an active member of the American Association of Woodturners, and demonstrates her woodturning techniques at national symposiums and local clubs. She has instructional DVD/videos, and she shares her passion for woodturning around the world.





TIPS AND TRICKS



Scott Synnott shared with us at the meeting his trick for maintaining the deep beautiful color of the cedar. He used Krylon clear spray. He said the he tried to degloss the piece a little with a judicious polish using 4-0 steel wool. Note that there are several variations in the Krylon clear series. He chose this one as it is advertised as interior and exterior. Although it stinks during application, it drys fast and can be lightly sanded between coats. Does not run anywhere near as bad as spray lacquer. Thank you Scott
